Welcome to all our new Foundation Stage children! We are absolutely delighted that they have all settled in so happily!

Most of our learning so far has been based around two of our favourite woodland stories, Owl Babies and Goldilocks and the Three Bears. We had to find clues to the Goldilocks story on the playground and we have



retold the story with puppets and role play, identifying the main events and talking about the characters.

We have been counting bears and problem solving using different sizes of bears, including sharing the food out so that Daddy Bear had more food than Baby Bear. We found a broken chair in our classroom and we all think we know who did that!

The children have all shown a tremendous interest in learning new things and we are having a lot of fun together!



#### Year 1

Year 1 have started the term with a BANG! The children have been our real life superheroes, settling into Year 1 and taking on challenges with a fantastic mindset.

We have been incredibly busy focusing on our "Superheroes" topic and participating in Commando Joe's missions. In particular, we have been discovering information about heroes from the past and present. We have enjoyed looking at real-life superheroes such as doctors and nurses who are so vital in these challenging times. In our Superhero themed day, lots of us came dressed as our favourite superheroes and have enjoyed a day full of superhero tasks!







#### Year 2 – Street Detectives

As part of their new topic on 'Street Detectives', year 2 have enjoyed learning all about the history of Ratby and they recently went on a village walk to spot local landmarks and historical sights in the community. The children were very interested to learn all about the old butcher's shop and were surprised to learn that the location of the old Co-op used to be a cinema! The topic has focused on learning about the history of the village of Ratby and we have been looking at how it has changed over time. As you can imagine, the children have been very excited looking at maps and old photos of the village to work out what has changed in the local community.

Year 2 are very much looking forward to learning more about the 'Street Detectives' topic and are excited to describe their route to school, including any local features they spot along the way.



#### Year 3 – Mighty Metals

This term Year 3's topic Mighty Metals was brimming with scientific investigations about forces, magnets, metals, push and pull action, pulleys and levers. Our young scientists have been conducting many experiments that involve measuring forces and deciding on materials that enable objects to travel faster. The Iron Man, the main character from our novel study, is looking for a friend to keep him company. The children have been asked to design a prototype friend that can stop him from being lonely using various household recycled materials. But who will he choose? This is an opportunity to present their companion by discussing how they made their robotic friend for Iron Man, but also providing us with a list of instructions on how he can be operated. A must if he is going to be a lifelong companion!



#### Year 4 – Ukelele Lessons

Year 4 have started learning the ukulele this term with our very own ukulele teacher! They have learnt the notes and beats of songs such as 'Shotgun' by George Ezra and 'Despacito' by Justin Bieber. Instruments can be very tricky to grasp but the year 4 children have shown persistence and resilience to learning something new. At the end of the sessions, children will be performing songs to the opposite class and be putting on a show, how exciting!



#### Year 5 – Commando Joe's

Commando Steve from Commando Joe's has been teaching Year 5 about Space.

- 1. On our first mission, we made a 2D astronaut suit on the floor
- 2. On our second mission, we made a rocket, that our team could sit on
- 3. On our third mission, we created a rocket out of a plastic bottle, each class launched 6 rockets. We used white vinegar, bicarbonate of soda, a cork and a launch pad of jenga blocks. It was very exciting!


We are hoping to choose one of the entries to be made into a real banner for the fence outside to school to help everyone to remember how to keep us safe.

Commando Joe employs military veterans from across the armed forces, who have shown bravery and strength of character in some of the most demanding situations. They pick the best and retrain them to go into schools and pass their unique skill set on to the next generation.

Based on the lives of real-life adventurers and explorers, such as Sir Ranulph and Tim Peake, pupils learn about a different hero or heroine over each half term, with practical and mental tasks to complete based on their adventures The COJO Character for Learning programme will provide pupils with the character tools and values they need to be successful in life such as resilience, determination, empathy, and courage.

This will be achieved through children:

- Accessing coherent, sequential learning
- Being inspired to do their best and have ambition to achieve
- Leading and being led to achieve outcomes
- Engaging in deep thinking to support their decision-making and action(s)
- Experiencing a wide range of relevant and exciting activity

Lessons are supported with "field report" films featuring Commando Joe, developed by a Bafta-winning animation company.

This half term children in EYFS developed their skills through looking at traditional nursery rhyme characters such as 3 Blind Mice and Humpty Dumpty. In Year 1 children have loved learning about Steve Backshall, whilst Year 5 have learnt the adventures of Tim Peake and Year 6 followed in the footsteps of Ibn Battutua.



# Could your child be entitled to a



Families of children and young people in full-time education at any school may be entitled to claim free school meals, providing they receive a qualifying benefit. Do you receive any of these benefits?

- Income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Children who get paid these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, can also get free school meals.

Your child may also get free school meals if you get any of these benefits and your child is both:

- younger than the compulsory age for starting school
- in full-time education.

If your child is eligible for free school meals, they'll remain eligible until they finish the phase of schooling (primary or secondary) they're in on 31 March 2022.
